

Australian Immunisation Register (AIR)

What is the AIR register?

The Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) is a national register that records vaccines given to all people in Australia.

The AIR includes vaccines given:

- under the National Immunisation Program
- through school programs
- privately, such as for flu or travel.

You don't need to add yourself to the AIR. If you're enrolled in Medicare, you'll already be on the AIR.

If not, you will be added to the AIR when a recognised vaccination provider informs Services Australia that they have given you an immunisation.

Updating the AIR

You can't update the AIR. Only a recognised vaccination provider can update the register. This includes doctors, such as a general practitioner or community health centre. You'll need to ask your vaccination provider to do this.

There are a few ways they can update the AIR. One way is using the AIR site. If they use the AIR site, you'll see changes to your immunisation history statement straight away. Other methods take longer.

Services Australia will update your immunisation history statement once they receive the details. Sometimes the immunisations you or your child have had might be missing on the immunisation history statement. If this happens, check with your vaccination provider that that your details have been updated on the AIR.
